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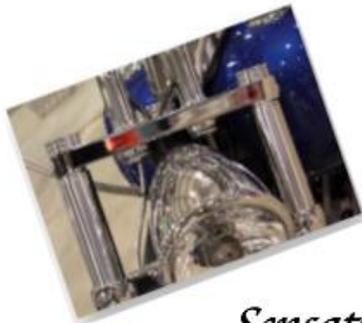



Angaston Ride Leader Peter Wood

The Stick Shed

There is a post it note on our calendar that gets shifted to the next page when a new month rolls around. It has on it a short list of spur of the moment ride destinations that involve a few days away. The Stick Shed in Murtoa, Victoria had been on the list for a while so with the borders open and the weather forecast favourable it moved to the top of the list.

Day 1 Adelaide to Natimuk 425K.

We used the National Highway before turning off just before Nhill to head through the Little Desert then east onto Mitre Road. The Arapiles could be seen in the distance as we approached Natimuk.



Mount Arapiles is a world-famous rock climbing and abseiling destination. Natimuk is a small farming town which benefits from its proximity and probably explains the row of self-contained cabins behind the National Natimuk Hotel. Our cabin was roomy and clean and the food at the pub good.

Day 2 Natimuk to Murtoa Stick Shed via Horsham and back 110K.

The Murtoa Grain Store was constructed in 1941 as a solution to the World War II wheat glut when exports were restricted. It earned its name from the 560 unmilled poles that support the corrugated iron roof. At 19 metres high along the ridgeline and the length of 5 Olympic swimming pools it's hard to miss but once inside its impressive size is quite awe inspiring. I was not disappointed. Dubbed the Cathedral of the Wimmera it is 101 on the Australian Heritage List, the highest heritage listing in the country.



Lake Marma, in the middle of Murtoa is a shady, attractive spot for a break. I had looked at Murtoa Cabins on Lake Marma for accommodation for the trip but they were fully booked. Not surprising considering their prime location.

Day 3 Natimuk, Francis, Bordertown, home 425K.

Stopping briefly to capture a picture of the morning sun on the rock faces of the Arapiles we headed for Francis. I have a fondness for the section of road between Francis and Bordertown. There is rarely traffic, and the remnant strips of eucalyptus woodland lining the road have the feel of big tree country. On this morning there was an almost alarming amount of birdlife including: two small groups of red-tailed cockatoos, - not enough birds in each to refer to a crackle (I had to look up that collective noun), a pair of wedgetail eagles perched atop a gigantic dead gum and a game little Bronzewing that Brenton clocked at 110kph.



Breakfast was at The Morning Loaf Bakery at Bordertown which had good coffee. Just as well because the next stop was home.

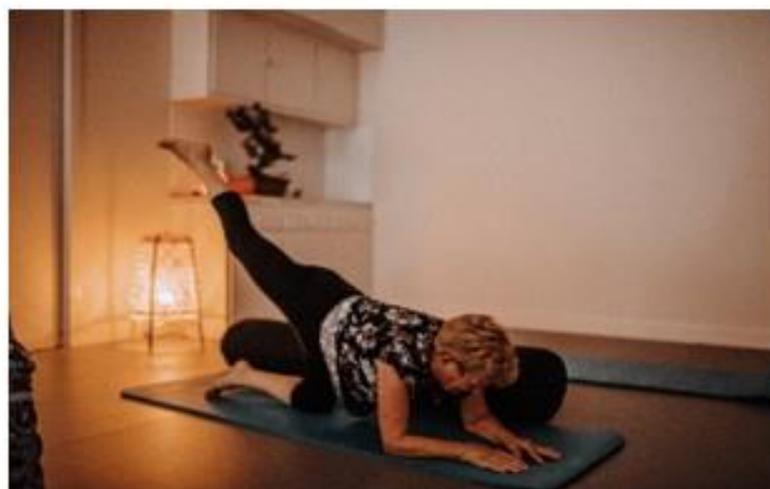
