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

Di is a fellow Ulyssian and WIMA member who headed out to Africa to work about 3 years ago. She is the Team Leader/Clinical Educator in the Medical Unit of the King Faisal Hospital ('best equipped and most modern hospital in Africa', so reads the spiel). Kigali, the capital of Rwanda is where she is based.

Whilst there, she has come across a group of boys (orphans), 150 at the last count, who live in a disused and very old factory. They sleep on the ground, and for meals, when they can get any, eat maize rice and water mixed with beans. Di shops, whenever she gets the chance, for greens at the local markets. With Di's help, they now have rabbits, doing what good bunnies do, and now numbering 100 or so, ducks and chickens. The duck eggs are mainly for the boys with HIV as they contain the high protein they require to prolong their lives.

Recently, someone donated uniforms for the boys so they feel a part of the whole. If you wish to visit Di, you will get a visit with the boys and have a game of footy, Aussie style. Some of the boys attend primary school, with a few in secondary and technical school.

About 50 people joined Di on Monday, 19th January, at the Rollin Restaurant, whilst she was home in Adelaide. I'm pleased to say, due to the great generosity of those present, an amount of \$1000 was raised to put with some \$8,000 she has already raised for her boys.

Di's Dream: To build a boarding school for her beloved boys. Any help we, as Ulyssians, can give her would be greatly appreciated, I know. Dreams can come true with out help.

Tickets are on sale for \$1 each and are available from Liv Andersen, Sue Freene and myself.


The President of the Mallee Branch, Toddie, has agreed to the raffle being drawn at the Odyssey on the long weekend in October. Thank you, Mallee Branch.

Sponny and Trevor attended to the ablutions and Trevor presented us with a brand, new, state of the art toilet that he had bought and modified to fit our mesh floor. A beautiful thing to behold!

We lit the big fire and cooked tea - still pouring - it did not let up. The outside of the tent was slippery that we decided to buy some hay from the farmer to sop up the puddles. It worked really well and we had no mishaps.

The coffee pot was going full bore, the red wine was flowing, munchies came out and we had a party inside the tent because it was too wet to stand out around the fire.

On Saturday morning, a couple of old favourites - Daryl Poole and Tom Gouras - rocked up. We went into Eudunda to watch the start and to listen to the riders briefing - Phil picked up the clock and the paperwork. We also met Alan and Chi Wa there.

There were about 180 riders - 25 outfits and the rest solos. They all looked so clean and the bikes were magnificent - some very impressive. We watched the first few start, saw Rick and Ronda again, then went back to our checkpoint to have lunch and await the arrival of the first bikes. By now, the rain had stopped and the wind was cranking up!

Sponny got the roster organised and everyone had their jobs. A few others arrived, among them Frank and his family, who, whilst trying to erect their tent in the wind, snapped a pole and ripped a hole through the top of the tent. They slept in their car Saturday night.

The first round came and went. We walked part of the course and watched the riders enter the huge washaways that were part of our control area. It was a really good spot to watch from. Consequently, we had dozens of visitors right through the afternoon, night and into the next morning.

It got really cold Saturday night. The fire was fantastic, but the swirling wind made it too uncomfortable to sit around. However, there were people around it all night - the wives, girlfriends, onlookers and a couple of the time-keepers all enjoyed our fire.

The second round slipped by - by now it was a howling gale. The ever-faithful dawn crew braved the bitter cold and got up at 3.15 am. Kerry, Phil, Brian, Don and Cookie were joined by Frank. Good on them!! It was freezing!!

The wind did not let up all through the night - it howled and banged. We put extra ropes on our tent.

We had a huge fry-up for breakfast - patties, sausages, bacon, eggs, mushrooms, toast. Then we started dismantling the camp while waiting for round four.

By now the riders were riding from memory - they looked so tired. The last lap finished at about 1.30 pm. Fifty-seven bikes returned, one broken leg, one broken arm, concussion, breakdowns - all par for the course.

We were all done by 3.30 with everything packed into the 4 trailers, and as we headed home, it started raining - again!

4 THINGS YOU PROBABLY NEVER KNEW YOUR MOBILE PHONE COULD DO

There are a few things that can be done in times of grave emergencies. Your mobile phone can actually be a life saver or an emergency tool for survival. Check out the things that you can do with it:

FIRST Emergency

The Emergency Number worldwide for Mobile is 112. If you find yourself out of the coverage area of your mobile network and there is an emergency, dial 112 and the mobile will search any existing network to establish the emergency number for you, noting this number (112) can be dialed even if the keypad is locked. Try it out!

SECOND

Have you locked your keys in the car? Does your car have remote keyless entry? This may come in handy someday. Good reason to own a cell phone: If you lock your keys in the car and the spare keys are at home, call someone at home on their mobile phone from your cell phone.

Hold your cell phone about a foot from your car door and have the person at your home press the unlock button, holding it near the mobile phone on their end. Your car will unlock. Saves someone from having to drive your keys to you. Distance is no object. You could be hundreds of miles away, and if you can reach someone who has the other 'remote' for your car, you can unlock the doors (or the trunk). Editor's Note: It works fine! We tried it out and it unlocked our car over a mobile phone!'

THIRD

Hidden Battery Power
Imagine your mobile battery is very low. To activate, press the keys: *3370#

How to disable a STOLEN mobile phone?
To check your Mobile phone's serial number, key in the following digits on your phone: * # 0 6 #
A 15 digit code will appear on the screen. This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. When your phone gets stolen, you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset so even if the thief changes the SIM card, your phone will be totally useless. You probably won't get your phone back, but at least you know that whoever stole it can't use/sell it either. If everybody does this, there would be no point in people stealing mobile phones.
